## Faith Communities in Croydon

- Findings from the 2006 Mapping Exercise

#### **Faiths Together in Croydon**

The idea of having a group of all the faiths together in Croydon has been in the air for some time. In 2002/3 a series of themed lunches were held in different places of worship which were well attended by people of many of the faiths in Croydon. There was also a short lived newsletter which tried to inform the different communities of shared activities within the borough. As part of the regeneration of the north west of Croydon a study of all the worshipping groups in that part of Croydon was undertaken, the two main purposes of this were to locate all the worshipping groups and to find out about the community activities that they were providing.

In 2006 a group led by the Bishop of Croydon's representative, Barry Goodwin, was given the working title 'Faiths Together in Croydon' with a brief to find all the worshipping groups in the whole of the Borough of Croydon and invite them to meet together to discuss their similarities, the needs of their followers and to share common concerns.

A suggested draft set of objectives for the group was;

- To develop liaison and understanding between the faith communities of Croydon
- To work with the Boroughs residents, statutory authorities, private and voluntary sector in a common effort to improve the condition of life for people in the area.
- To provide forums where faith communities, their organisations and their leaders can engage in dialogue and exchange information on ways in which to develop social inclusion

This report is mainly concerned with the answers to a set of questions (Table 1) that were asked either in face to face interviews, with leaders of worshipping groups who have their own premises, or sent by e mail. Although answers were not received from every leader in the second survey enough people responded to make a representative sample. The questions particularly focussed on the community activities that take place in the premises owned by a group, whether put on by the group or by outsiders, and the priorities that leaders of faith groups see as important for the local area or for Croydon as a whole.

There are two hundred and sixty worshipping groups in the whole of Croydon, just over half of these are to be found in NW Croydon, seventy eight of these groups do not have a place of worship of their own and are either sharing premises with another group or meet in school halls or community halls. Fifty of the groups without premises are to be found in NW Croydon and are mainly the Black led, Pentecostal or Evangelical groups who want to worship in their own way. Almost none of the churches in the rest of Croydon share their premises; this is where the other groups meet in school premises. Some groups are worshipping in their own language, Tamil, Iranian, Ghanaian, Nigerian and Ugandan were the main examples of this. A few were groups that had been 'planted' by other churches outside Croydon and have now

grown to sizeable communities. Where a group is sharing other worshipping group's premises there is very little communication between the groups and the host group generally see the arrangement as a means of raising funds for their own group. Many of the leaders who were renting out their premises to other groups knew virtually nothing about the other faith group; in some cases they were not even sure of the correct name of the other group. Rarely the worship space is lent to a group for the purpose of baptism, funerals or weddings. One leader said that he would not rent to other groups because he believed that everyone should worship together.

Although on the whole there is no link or support between these worship groups a few of the host leaders give some space in a news sheet or magazine and a couple of leaders have had joint celebrations at a time of festival.

There are thirty four different types of worship taking place in Croydon and twenty five of theses are represented within NW Croydon

From this it can be seen that Croydon has a higher population of Hindu and Buddhist worshippers than the average for England and Wales and a higher population of Christians, Hindus, Muslims and people of 'other' religions than London as a whole and a slightly smaller number of people with no religion than London. Altogether 79% of the population of Croydon said that they belonged to a religious group which is a higher percentage of people than for England as a whole. See appendix 1 for a breakdown of religious affiliation by ward.

Map 1 shows the distribution of the places where worship is carried out throughout Croydon. This includes schools and community centres where groups meet to worship.

#### **Answers to the Questions** (see table 1)

Generally a place of worship with a premise of its own also has a hall of some kind. The usual is a hall with kitchen facilities and at least one subsidiary room for meetings. Larger premises often have a small and a large hall one of which has a stage. Often these facilities are underused, where a nursery or playschool rents the space during the day this is not the case, but most spaces are only rented to groups during the evenings or for an hour or so during the day in the week. Some of the larger places of worship in the borough run many different activities and act as community centres for the worshipping group. The Mosque and the Gurdwara, the Salvation Army citadel, West Croydon Baptists, Purley URC, Purley Baptist Church and the Parchmore centre come into this category while a few other leaders are currently considering their mission and changes to the way they run.

Virtually all the places of worship now have disabled access to most of the facilities and disabled toilets. Where there are two halls, it is common for one to be upstairs and therefore there is often disabled access to only one of these.

The majority of the leaders interviewed said that the congregation was very local and either from within the 'parish' or from within 2-3 miles distance. In the case of churches that said the congregation was very local there were occasionally members who had moved to another part of Croydon but still returned to them to worship because of family or friendship links.

The Parish size of the Roman Catholic churches is greater than other churches and their congregation are drawn from a ten mile radius. Some of the longer distances travelled were because people want to worship in their native language and are prepared to travel to do so. This is particularly true of the Polish and Greek churches, which also have a very large 'parish' area. People also travel a long way to worship at the Mosque and Gurdwara. Some of the Evangelical churches also attract congregants from as far away as North London and Guildford.

The majority of faith groups in Croydon are open and inclusive. The activities that are about worship including Bible study and prayer groups are all open to anyone who wants to come, although in practise it is generally taken to mean a person of that particular faith. Groups such as the Mothers Union and some of the Men's and Women's groups are also mainly for worshipping members although friends from outside the worship group are also included in many cases.

One activity that is solely for members of the worship group is connected to music and choir practise. Places of worship which have one or more choirs hold weekly choir practise for the members and also generally have some social activities for the choir members. The Guild of St Stephen is a group for servers in some churches; this group is made up from members of the worship group and involves training and social activities within the membership. The Catholic churches have a group called St Vincent de Paul which has youth and adult sections. This is a group which goes out and serves the wider community in many ways but is made up of the Catholic worshipping group members.

Refreshments after a service are generally the only thing particularly exclusive to the worshippers. However the Gurdwara welcomes anyone to come and join their after worship meal and at least one Anglican church welcomes refugees to come and have a hot drink and biscuit after a service whether they have attended worship or not. Eating and drinking together is an important part of the community activity of virtually every worship group. For instance, several groups hold an annual picnic or barbeque for their own worship group to gather together and socialise.

In light of the answers to the final question on priorities for the future, the discussion on the use of premises by the worshipping group and by people from the wider community is very interesting. As has been seen the faith groups of Croydon are generally very open to the wider community, while

inviting people to join in with worship is of course a main priority. There are two types of activities apart from worship that take place. One set of activities are mainly social activities that the faith group and their friends take part in at the premises. These include activities related in some way to the worship of the group for example festivals or social activities that have a fundraising purpose. The second set of activities are organised by people who have rented the hall space and are mainly independent from the worship group. Some of these activities are initiated, funded and run by the Primary Care Trust or Social Services.

The activities being carried out in places of worship have an obvious benefit to the wider community, but one of the chief reasons for groups renting out their space is to provide funding for their own activities, or money for the general day to day cost of running the premises. The only other sources of income for any faith group are the offerings made by members and occasional donations and bequests. Where hall facilities have been upgraded, or are relatively newly built, income from renting the hall space can be almost the main source of income, for instance, one church told me that they collect £30,000 per year in rent. Some of the newer buildings, particularly those belonging to the Salvation Army, are also let out for conferences.

If the activity is put on by members of the worshipping group for the people of the wider community it is almost always funded by the faith community itself. Where the community activities are organised and run by the worship group there is often a core group of workers who are involved in many activities and sometimes the group fails through a lack of new volunteers or their energy. It was rare to find any group that had received grants for their activities; applying for grants for running an activity is not generally seen as a viable option. Often grants are only available for a project, rather than for an ongoing activity. Also the time involved in finding and then applying for a grant is time consuming and the manpower is not available for this. However some premises have received or applied for grants to cover big building and renovation projects. Links with local businesses are also rare. One Hindu group has a link with some local businesses and a couple of the Christian groups have had sponsorship from businesses local to the individual church. Some groups who have a monthly magazine allow businesses to pay for advertisements.

The activities taking place in the places of worship in Croydon cover every aspect of life from ante natal classes to funeral wakes. There are numerous types of day time activities that deal with parenting/babies and toddlers and evening classes on a diverse range of subjects. There are also uniformed organisations for children, youth groups, almost every type of dancing and social concern. There are many activities aimed specifically at the elderly, however it is noticeable that activities for the elderly are more successful when held during the daytime and at premises that have some sort of transport arrangements. Several lunch clubs and 'pop-ins' had closed down because people were not able or willing to get to them on their own. There is however a 'good neighbour' scheme running successfully in some parts of the study area which provides help for the house bound (see table 2).

One problem for the worship groups connected to renting out their space is the need for cleaners, and caretakers and it is difficult to get volunteers to go out at night to do cleaning ready for Sunday use by the worship group and to lock up the premises. This means that some spaces are not let out as much as the group would like. The support given to the people who rent space is very varied. On the whole the host worship group do not give any support to outside renters even expecting them to pay for advertising in the parish magazine. Occasionally there is some mixing as some members from the congregation join in an evening class or activity that is independently taking place in their own hall. One or two ministers visit groups taking place but this is the exception rather than common practise. One finding that came out very strongly was that although the faith communities offer multiple activities within the premises, both run by the worshipping members and by outside agencies, it was very clear that each group knew very little, if anything, about the community activities that were taking place elsewhere, even in the other faith premises nearby. Many of the leaders interviewed do see this as a problem but justified it by discussing the energy and commitment of their members regarding what they were managing to do within their own premises.

# What are the priorities for the local area or Croydon as a whole as perceived by the leaders of faith groups?

The faith leaders of Croydon have very similar concerns, youth, the elderly and outreach to the wider community. Obviously many of the answers to this question were about connecting with God and evangelising, strengthening the social fabric and forging links with the community. Also high on the list of everyone's priorities were new sources of income in order to carry out their plans. Many leaders, particularly in the north of the borough see a need for major building work to enhance their community facilities. Others see a need to upgrade the facilities, particularly kitchens, in order to be able to rent the premises out to more groups and therefore generate income for their own worshipping group. Many of the people spoken to also said that a group such as Faiths Together in Croydon was needed

In the North West Croydon study the majority of leaders said that youth activities were a priority. Asking the same question in the rest of Croydon brought a slightly different response. Although there was some mention of the need for youth activities, and a couple of places had recently employed youth workers, the majority answer was concerned with outreach to the community. The loneliness and isolation of the elderly is a worry to most leaders and support for them and for young families seems to be seen as a way to strengthen our social fabric. The idea of outreach to the lonely was not seen as part of gathering more people for the congregation but a real desire to help people. Many of the churches in Croydon are part of a scheme to provide a floating night shelter for the homeless during the winter months. The problem of fear of going out at night is prevalent among the older generation and of course people who are not already part of a group would not necessarily know what is already on offer. Considering the number of social activities that are to

be found in the places of worship there would seem to be no need to be lonely.

The question of attracting youth to activities that are put on for them also poses some problems. A youth version of Faiths Together, where young people have an opportunity to discuss their needs could be an answer.

Other ideas that leaders have for reaching out to the wider community involved work on cultural links and English classes or other types of learning for the many immigrants who live in Croydon. Of the activities already on offer (table 2) this is an area that is not really catered for at all. Some of the Christian parishes are in the process of deciding their priorities at the moment in line with an initiative from the Church of England.

#### Conclusions

The concerns of all the leaders who answered the questions were very similar. Where discussion have taken place with leaders of Worshipping groups who do not have their own premises the concerns and aspirations reflect these.

Three groups particularly concern the faith leaders of Croydon;

#### Youth:

Virtually all leaders in NW Croydon said youth work was a priority. A smaller number of people said this in the rest of Croydon.

#### Elderly;

Worry about outreach to the elderly was the majority answer in the rest of Croydon although over a quarter of the population of north Croydon is over sixty

#### Loneliness;

Many leaders spoke about the need for outreach, not necessarily trying to gather a flock but just to address the problem of loneliness.

The general feeling seems to be that if these concerns could be addressed we would achieve better community cohesion and an improvement in the social fabric of Croydon.

#### Barriers;

- A lack of knowledge of the differences and, more importantly, the similarities between the worshipping groups
- Leaders are very busy and do not know what is being offered or planned at other places of worship.
- The numerous activities on offer are often only seen as a way to gain revenue.
- Volunteers are so busy that they have not time to find out what else is going on.
- Volunteers have a finite amount of time and energy.
- Caretaking and cleaning of premises is often a barrier to use.
- Often a lack of income prevents a group from carrying out future plans.
- It is possible people don't know about the numerous secular activities they could be joining in with at almost every place of worship.

#### Recommendations;

- A directory of community activities available across the borough is currently being compiled by Croydon Voluntary Action. When completed this directory should be available at all places of worship.
- The host churches and groups renting space could work more closely together for the good of the local community.
- Education in the importance of understanding the many different cultures and traditions practised by the population of Croydon leading to a celebration of diversity.
- Interfaith collaboration on projects for the local community which would provide a larger volunteer force.
- Faith leaders to meet together and, while acknowledging their differences, share common ground to work together to give quality help to the young, old and lonely of the borough
- For faith leaders to adopt the draft objectives of Faiths Together in Croydon.





## Faith Groups in Croydon




Group Key: Blue- one group; Green – 2 groups; Yellow – 3 groups; Red – 4 Groups; Purple – 5 Groups

## **Faith Groups - North Croydon**




Group Key:
